## Citizen Science

If you spot any wildlife local to your house, or when out for exercise, BRLSI (<https://www.brlsi.org/node/add/sighting>) and BRERC ([recording.brerc.org.uk/node/62](http://recording.brerc.org.uk/node/62)) always want to know. This will help us monitor numbers over the years and where they're found. Local experts check the records as well, so don't worry if you're not completely confident in what you've seen. You might also like to use the IRecord and INaturalist apps for help with identification and to record what you've seen.

You can take part in the national survey counting pollinators (FIT surveys – Flower-Insect Timed surveys) which can be done in a garden. You just need 10 mins to watch insects.
